



Who draws the lines?

- Congressional lines are drawn by the state legislature and subject to a gubernatorial vote
- State legislative lines are drawn by the state legislature and subject to a gubernatorial vote
- The legislature receives input from an independent advisory commission, which the legislature may adopt, modify, or ignore the commission's proposed maps

Fair Count

- Federal equal population requirements and adherence to the Voting Rights Act and constitutional rules on race
- Congressional districts recommended by the advisory commission must have a total deviation of no more than 1% from largest to smallest, and state legislative districts recommended by the advisory commission must have a total deviation of no more than 10% form largest to smallest (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4))
- Maps recommended by the commission:
 - May not use race as a predominant factor in drawing line (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4))
 - Be contiguous and reasonably compact (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4)-(5))
 - Preserve communities of interest and the core of prior districts (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4)-(5))
 - Follow natural, geographic, or manmade features/boundaries (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4)-(5))
 - Nest boundaries of different types of districts (Utah Code § 20A-20-302(4)-(5))
 - May not intentionally favor or disfavor candidate/parties (Utah Code § 20A-302(4)-(5))
