

ABOUT THE PUZZLES

You hold in your hand a set of 51 puzzles—one for each of the United States plus an extra one for Washington, D.C. (Unless you printed out only specific pages, in which case you hold in your hand that subset of puzzles.) The puzzles cover a range of genres almost as wide as the geographical area that inspired them: You'll find crosswords, you'll find word searches, you'll find logic puzzles, you'll find puzzles that defy easy categorization.

And while these puzzles were inspired by a need to *Do Something* to help strengthen U.S. democracy, what you will *not* find in these pages is political finger-pointing at any particular state. Even in the states where the most extreme politicians are trying to restrict voting rights or attempting to gerrymander opposing parties out of existence, there are plenty of people who remain staunchly pro-democracy. We'd rather celebrate the various United States with our puzzles, and let superb groups like Common Cause fight the battles that need fighting.

A FEW THINGS YOU MIGHT WANT TO KNOW

- The puzzles in this set go (roughly) from "fairly easy" at the start to "pretty darn hard" at the end. It's impossible to get the difficulty scale right for *everybody*, of course, so if you run into a stumper, that doesn't mean every puzzle after that will be beyond you. Keep solving!
- Many of the puzzles in this set have a "meta answer," or a second step that will reveal a
 pertinent fact or the answer to a riddle. Often these meta answers involve "indexing"—
 taking a provided number, and counting that number of letters into your previous answers.
 The resulting letters will spell out the meta answer, which will often take the form of a
 very bad pun.
- Other puzzles *don't* depend on indexing, and sometimes you'll need to have a little a-ha to figure out how to reach the final answer. And some puzzles don't have meta answers at all.

If you enjoy these puzzles, please help spread the word of their existence! We hope to raise a lot of money for Common Cause so that they can continue to fight for voting rights and democracy, both in the courtroom and in the court of public opinion.




Ohioans absolutely love to point out the O's that begin and end their state's name. We thought it would be fun to get in on the action.

What is an apt description of our journey through this great state?





After growing up in Boston, Ben Franklin ran away to Philadelphia at age 17 and left his stamp on the city for centuries to come. Franklin was the only Founding Father to sign the Declaration of Independence, the American Constitution, and the Bill of Rights. He was also an inventor, postmaster, firefighter, and printer.

Furthermore, Franklin was the lead member of the Committee of Secret Correspondence. As you solve each puzzle, fill its six-letter answer into the diagram, top to bottom. Then, use letter pairs to index into the cryptic message. For example, the bigram AD, where A is the first letter of the alphabet and D is the fourth, would lead to the first word's fourth letter: V. Solved correctly, you'll reveal the answer to this question:



POSTMASTER


While serving as the first U.S. Postmaster General, Ben Franklin made countless reforms improving the speed and reliability of mail delivery. He signed his letters "B. Free Franklin" in protest of British rule (and you can still get that postmark on your letters today at one historic post office in Philadelphia!).

Six of Franklin's friends adopted similarly punny pseudonyms, but their first initials have been lost. These friends include: a car part, a mythological hero, a playground fixture, a Philadelphia sports team, a musical plant owner, and a red puppet.

FIREFIGHTER

In 1736, Ben Franklin founded the first volunteer firefighting organization in the United States. In the Numberlink below, each fire truck must be connected to the fire with the same number using a continuous hose passing through the centers of cells and turning only horizontally or vertically. All cells in the grid must be filled. Hoses may not cross each other, and a single hose can never cover a 2x2 region. Once all the fires have been extinguished, convert the lengths of the hoses—not including the 🚝 or 🖖 cells—to letters. For example, the three given hoses (which do not contribute to this puzzle's final answer) are of lengths 2, 5, and 4, spelling BED.



PRINTER

Ben Franklin got his start as a printer, apprenticing for his brother starting at age 12. He went on to become a prolific journalist, owner of *The Pennsylvania Gazette* and his own printing house, and publisher of *Poor Richard's Almanack*. In each of the following aphorisms originally included in the *Almanack*, one word has been edited.

Don't throw hotness at your neighbors, if your own windows are glass.

Love your Enemies, for they tell you your Sulfate.

Pardoning the Drab, is injuring the Good.






ONE IF BY LAND, TWO IF BY SEA








Except for an example to start you off, the black and white circles are not specified explicitly. In each pair of circles in the same location in the two grids, one will be black and the other will be white—you will need to figure out which is which. There is only one way to fill in all the circles and complete both loops.





This puzzle's grid consists of several islands of connected white squares, separated by an ocean of shaded squares. 


